

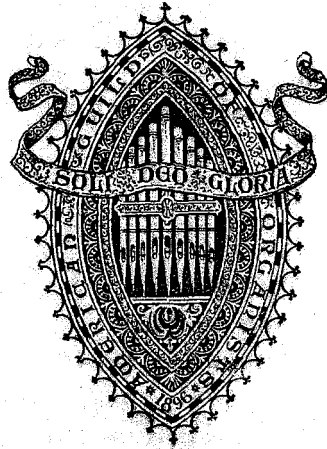

The American Guild of Organists was incorporated in New York in 1896 with a representative list of "Founders" from the principal cities of the land. It now has a highly creditable enrollment of Fellows (F. A. G. O.) and of Associates (A. A. G. O.) all over the country; it has, furthermore, an important number of Honorary Officers and Associates and of Subscribing Members. Several of the most distinguished organists in Europe are its Honorary Members. It is thoroughly organized for useful service. Chief among the objects of the Guild as set forth in the Constitution are: "The advancement of the cause of worthy church music, the elevation of the status and standard of church organists, the increase of the appreciation of their duties and opportunities as conductors in worship; to provide occasions of intercourse among church organists and the consideration of matters pertaining to their work."
