What are you doing to take care of yourself now?

We are all familiar with the default exchange of greetings with others these days: "So, how are you doing now?" Answered by, "Oh, ok I guess, hanging in there." I've been inspired by Elizabeth Weingarten's article in the *Quartz at Work* newsletter that examines strategies for meaningful engagement with our friends and coworkers during the pandem-



ic. The author proposes questions we might ask others in order to connect more deeply with them, in a way that moves from a rote or superficial exchange to one that builds relationships. The article, "Twenty Questions to ask instead of 'How are you doing right now?'" challenges us to develop skills as listeners, promotes a mindset of genuine concern for others, and invites us to ask questions of others and ourselves that can help us embrace the uncertainty of our lives.

This truly is an uncertain time for us AGO members, personally and professionally. We mourn the loss of our friend and colleague David Goulette, who was organist at Trinity Lutheran in Stillwater for many years. I have talked to a member who was furloughed from her church position, and who is not eligible for state unemployment insurance because her church did not participate in the program. I have heard from a dedicated church musician whose church has dealt her a deep salary cut. I know of other musicians - organists, singers, instrumentalists - who work as independent contractors or subs, and now have few or no gigs. Others, with some degree or another of gracefulness, are responding to the challenge to produce music for streamed or recorded worship, or trying to figure out how to manage meetings and lessons via Zoom. Some medically-vulnerable chapter members are isolated in home sequester, while others of us are dealing with sick parents, helping out family members who are unemployed, dealing with the stresses and dangers of working in essential jobs, or are just struggling to make online school "normal" for their kids. The ability of the AGO to fulfill its mission has been seriously crippled by cancelation of the national convention and other summer events.

My 89-year-old mother asks me every day, "When is this all going to end?" The stress of uncertainty, the discomfort we are feeling when we don't know what the future holds, is a kind of anticipatory grief. Scott Berinato writes in the *Harvard Business Review* that understanding grief, its stages, and accepting the

Sunday, June 7 POSTPONED Members Recital grief can give us a certain power over the uncertainty. The grief with the virus is confusing because we know something bad is happening, but we can't see it. We have lost our individual and collective sense of safety. Bernato advises us to find balance, come into the present, let go of what we can't control and stock up on compassion. This brings me back to the idea of connecting with people, allowing ourselves to name our grief, let the feeling go through us, and keep going.

In a *Time* magazine article, Anglican bishop and biblical scholar N.T. Wright argues that Christianity offers no answers about the Coronavirus and is not even supposed to. He proposes that we need to recover the biblical tradition of lament, which is what happens when we ask "Why?" and don't get an answer. It's where we get when we look beyond our own small sufferings and inconveniences, and look more broadly at the suffering of others, in our neighborhoods and around the world. The psalms almost always move toward light and thanksgiving at the end, even after plumbing the depths. "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?" In crying out to God we don't get an explanation, but we are reassured and renewed by God's presence. Even more importantly, the mystery of the biblical narrative is that God also laments. Story after story shows God grieving over his creatures' wickedness, Jesus weeping at Lazarus' tomb, the Holy Spirit groaning within the pain of the whole creation. Wright says:

As the Spirit laments within us, so we become, even in our self-isolation, small shrines where the presence and healing love of God can dwell. And out of that there can emerge new possibilities, new acts of kindness, new scientific understanding, new hope. New wisdom for our leaders? Now there's a thought.

Which brings me back to my question: what are you doing to take care of yourself now? I believe that for us musicians the more relevant question should be "What are you doing to take care of others now?" The manifold ways our members have jumped in to serve their congregations with recording and streaming musical liturgy under very restrictive conditions, the ways they have struggled to learn new technologies, have reached out to others as best they can with the gift of music, have discovered new depths of commitment to their vocation as ministers even when facing family difficulties, financial challenges, and even unjust professional treatment - all deserve our thanks and praise. I believe that music itself provides a sense of permanence in times of uncertainty. But, remembering our Guild's motto, Soli Deo Gloria, the musical work of God we are doing connects us to God's transcendent presence, and renews us for mission. For that work, all of you deserve a great debt of gratitude, and have my profound appreciation.

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Easter Reflections - 2020

It's Easter Sunday. The churches are closed, to avoid infection, and the snow is swirling around the neighborhood, with more predicted. The opening sounds of Handel's *Messiah* make me feel like Christmas. What, dear God, is happening to us? Cantata texts from Holy Saturday echo in my ears: "My weak heart indeed feels fear, care, pain: Where shall my body find rest? By whom shall my soul be freed and released? And where shall my loved ones be driven?"

Then come the oratorio's words: "But thou didst not leave his soul in hell ... Easter is still a day to proclaim *Hallelujah!* Whatever we have seen or suffered, whatever the future holds for us, our churches, communities, and nations – a new day is here!

We see the causes of our struggles in forces beyond our control, or maybe as results of our carelessness and neglect. Blaming ourselves or others for current problems finds few solutions. What Easter tells us is that God has embraced humanity in a new way – forgiveness or redemption or salvation – that sets us free to overcome evil with good, disease with health, and despair with hope. And fortunately for us Christians, Easter continues for seven weeks, giving us time to heal, grow, and rise up to a great vision of restoration and promise for our world. Peace to you all!


