Dean's Column

Sound

Organists, like all musicians – though it sometimes seems even more than other musicians – are always concerned about sound. Pitch, timbre, loudness, ensemble, balance, regulation across a rank of pipes, and relationships of



ranks to one another are on our minds all the time. They regularly fill note pads on our consoles and are just as regularly discussed with organ technicians. Recently a number of lectures and articles I have been asked to prepare led me to address the importance of sound in a more general sense. This general sense lies under the details we normally attend to as organists, but points to their importance in ways we don't always think about.

We, in our cultural setting, tend to think that meaning is an exclusively rational matter, comprehended solely by words we speak, hear, read, and write. In fact, sound precedes words and underlies their meaning. Thomas Troeger, for example, has pointed out that he knows the character of a phone call from the greeting before any words about content are expressed. Little children provide another example. Well before they can talk, they run sounds together with inflections in phrases that speak vol-

umes. Exclamations, questions, sadness, and joy are among the things that children tell us simply by how they use sounds. It does not take long before we get their meanings.

Hildegard of Bingen emphasized the importance of sound in what she said about it in connection with God and in the music she wrote. Martin Luther could not get over the wonder of God's gift of sound and was even more astounded at the way its essence is let out when skillful composers craft it. Hildegard and Luther are not alone in thinking about this, though they are among those who have expressed it poignantly. They speak what we know but may not be likely or able to articulate.

Our concerns about sound are not organists' idiosyncratic obsessions. They are about an elemental reality of the universe, deeply related to words and the Word. Words deserve all of the importance and care we can give them. They are extremely important, but they cannot do everything. There is an underlying reality of sound, which should not be dismissed or forgotten. As Troeger says, for all of the "astounding things...that language can accomplish, it is still a net filled with holes, and there are vast currents of existence that it will never catch...grief too overwhelming to speak...grace too extravagant to name... beauty too intense to articulate...prayer too profound for our lips to shape into speech...with 'sighs too deep for words'" (Thomas Troeger, Wonder Reborn [Oxford: Oxford University Press, 2010], p. 88).

The student competition was held on Saturday, March 25, at Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. There was only one competitor this year.

Ben Kerswell played for the honor of representing the Twin Cities at the North Central Regional Con-



vention in Iowa City. Ben was awarded the first prize of \$2,000, generously given by the Schubert Club in collaboration with its Bruce P. Carlson Student Scholarship Competition. The judges were Chad Winterfeldt, Laura Edman and Tom Ferry.

A junior at St. Olaf College, Ben Kerswell is majoring in organ performance. Before studying at St. Olaf with Catherine Rodland, Ben studied in New Jersey with Joanne Rodland for five years. Ben has performed solo recitals at The Church of St. Louis, King of France in St. Paul; Central Synagogue in New York City; and West Side Presbyterian Church in Ridgewood, NJ.

For the past three summers, he has held organist positions at Pompton Valley Presbyterian Church in NJ and Holy Spirit Roman Catholic Church in Pequannock, NJ. He now serves as organist at All Saints Episcopal Church in Northfield, MN.



Membership Renewal

Soon it will be time to renew your membership for the 2017/2018 season. Notices will appear around May 1. Read this information carefully since there are several changes we want to highlight.

- (1) National has made a modest increase in the fees for all categories for the coming year. There will, however, be no increase for *Chapter Friends* since this doesn't involve National.
- (2) There will now be the possibility for you to receive *The American Organist* online rather than in print. For those opting to receive TAO online there will be an \$8 reduction in dues.
- (3) Some of the categories have changed. The *Student* category has been changed to *Young Organist* (under age 30). However, TCAGO will maintain a *Student* category (in addition to the *Young Organist*), which is free for students currently enrolled in a degree program. (This is subsidized by TCAGO and will not be available through *ONCARD*.) The *Partner* category was removed, so those formerly in this category will need to renew as *Regular* or *Special*.
- (4) Please refer to p. 7 of the April issue of *The American Organist* for further explanation of the new fees.
- (5) The TCAGO Board and the Membership Committee encourage all of you to renew your membership through our own website rather than through *ONCARD* (National). We can renew you at the local level more quickly this way and you will be credited for your payment sooner. Those members with dual chapters can renew through *ONCARD* or our TCAGO website.

MPR

Classical Minnesota Public Radio encourages you to enter your classical music performance events in the MPR online calendar.

On the top bar of the general MPR web page, click on "Events," then "Events Calendar," then "Classical Music." However, if you find yourself on the Classical MPR main page, click on "More," then "Events," then "Classical Music."

In either case, once on the page that lists Classical Music Events, if you wish to add your own upcoming activity, under the headline for "Calendar Events Home" at the top of the page you should find an additional prompt for "Submit Event." Fill in all appropriate boxes (and check to see if your venue is already logged into the system, which might save you some time).

Note that this MPR Calendar information will reach a different audience than that submitted to Barone for posting on the TCAGO/*Pipedreams* calendar pages. Both are free, the one a self-service feature and a separate vehicle by which you can let people (including the Classical MPR program hosts) know about your classical music concerts.

We also encourage you to regularly request organ selections on the "Friday Favorites" show with Steven Staruch. Encourage and promote the inclusion of more organ music in MPR's programming!
